

Brauchbares

1. You already know the use of **doch** as a flavoring particle. It can also have the meaning of *however* as in the words in line 5: **doch den Käse kauft Anna im türkischen Lebensmittelgeschäft.**
2. Anna notes that it is almost one o'clock and the stores will close soon (ll. 22–23). In the German-speaking countries, many small stores close early on Saturday.
3. In line 23, Anna says: "**Sebastian geh du bitte zur Bäckerei.**" **Geh** is a command or imperative form (see page 121) as in the English *Go to the bakery, please.* The pronoun **du** adds emphasis or clarification.
4. **Apotheke vs. Drogerie.** Anna tells David to buy the vitamins in the **Drogerie**, rather than in the **Apotheke**. An **Apotheke** sells both prescription and nonprescription drugs. A **Drogerie** sells a wide variety of products: toiletries, herbal and homeopathic remedies, toys, film, and vitamins, much as do American drugstores. A **Drogeriemarkt** is a larger self-service drugstore. There are generally fewer over-the-counter drugs in the German-speaking countries than in the United States and Canada. For instance, in Germany and Austria aspirin can be bought only in an **Apotheke**, although in Switzerland aspirin can also be bought in a **Drogerie**.
